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Rhododendron Drive Shoulder Extension Project Update

What started as a 10-foot wide separated multi-use path along the east side of Rhododendron Drive between 9th and Wildwinds has been changed into two (2) 6-foot wide paved shoulders along the 9th Street to Wildwinds corridor of


Rhododendron Drive. The two (2) 6-foot wide shoulders will use a fairly new product to the coast, permeable pavement, in order to lessen the impact to the native vegetation from stormwater quality swales.

With four public meetings and one open house during the fall of 2014, City Council selected the two (2) 6-foot wide shoulders,

utilizing permeable pavement, option for this section of Rhododendron Drive on December 1, 2014. City staff notified Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) and the consulting engineering firm of the decision.

The change from a single 10-foot wide multi-use path separated from the roadway by a vegetated stormwater swale to two (2) 6-foot wide paved shoulders necessitated changes in the engineering services contract. With holidays, a

retirement of the project manager from the consulting engineering firm, and the state process for review and approval of contracts it has taken some time to finalize a new contract. On March 31, 2015, the new contract and scope of services was approved and the consulting engineering firm was given the 'green light' to start working on the project once again.

As with most federal aid projects, they tend to move slowly. With the project now being constructed on both sides of the roadway (the single multi-use path would have been on the east side of Rhododendron Drive) additional survey, archeological, geotechnical investigations will need to be performed. This has set the project back more than a year for construction. The tentative schedule is now calling the construction plans and supporting documentation to be completed by December 2015. ODOT's review and approval of the plans will take several weeks, however we are anticipating that the project will go to bid by March 2016 and a bid opening at the end of May 2016. Construction would begin in July/August 2016 and the project should be completed by March 2017.

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Coming Summer 2015 – Grind/Inlay Paving Project on Rhododendron Drive!

With City Council adoption of the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Budget on June 1st, Florence Public Works is ready to move forward with a \$350,000 paving project along Rhododendron Drive between 9th and Wildwinds. The project will only address the travel lanes of the roadway and will not extend or enlarge the existing roadway shoulders at this time. Extension of the shoulder is anticipated to begin Summer 2016 as outlined on page 3.

The project will grind (also known as 'cold plane') the existing street surface to a depth of 2-inches and then inlay and pave back the street with a new Hot Mix Asphalt Cement (HMAC) wearing surface. The project will also include digging out and reconstructing 250 square yards of roadway area to address a road base failure area.



Again, this project will only remove and repave the roadway section between the fog lines. It will not extend beyond the existing paved area. The project will go out to bid in June and will be awarded in late July 2015. Once the project is awarded to a qualified contractor, construction could start in September 2015 and finish before the fall rains begin in October 2015.

Another pavement preservation project for summer 2015 will be the application of a hot oil chip and fog seal on Rhododendron Drive from 35th Street to Lighthouse Way. "Chip Sealing" is a common pavement maintenance practice that extends pavement life and provides a good driving surface. Since some Florence residents may not be familiar with the chip seal construction method, here are answers to some frequently asked questions.

How are Chip Seals Different from Asphalt Overlays?

The difference is in the construction method. Hot Mix Asphalt Cement pavement is produced by heating liquid asphalt and mixing it with aggregate, with the mix then spread and compacted to form a durable road structure and riding surface. Chip Sealing uses the same ingredients as asphalt concrete paving, but the construction method is different. With chip seals, a thin film of heated asphalt liquid is sprayed on the road surface, followed by the placement of small aggregates ("chips"). The chips are then compacted to orient the chips for maximum adherence to the asphalt, and excess stone is swept from the surface. The ingredients of hot mix asphalt and chip seals are the same; only the construction methods are different.

Why Use Chip Seals?

- 1. Chip seals provide the City with the opportunity to maintain the roads for very low cost.
- 2. A chip seal is about one fourth to one fifth the cost of a conventional asphalt overlay.
- 3. By extending the time between asphalt overlays, chip seals result in lower costs over the long term.
- 4. By placing a chip seal sooner than an asphalt overlay would be placed, the traveling public benefits from roads maintained in better condition.
- 5. Chip Seals eliminate the need to crack seal.
- 6. Chip seals enhance safety by providing good skid resistance.
- 7. Chip seals provide an effective moisture barrier for the underlying pavement against water intrusion by sealing cracks in the pavement.

8. Chip seals prevent deterioration of the asphalt surface from the effects of aging and oxidation due to water and sun.

- 9. Chip seals virtually eliminate black ice.
- 10. In hot weather, chip seals re-seal cracks by flowing back together.

How Are Chip Seals Placed?

First, the road surface needs to be properly cleaned of debris and any holes patched. Next, an asphalt distributor truck starts by spraying each lane with hot liquid asphalt to assure an even application. The asphalt used is applied at a temperature between 150 and 185 degrees Fahrenheit. A chip spreader follows as rapidly as possible with a rock application, preferably within one minute. The asphalt must be fluid so the rock will be embedded by the displacement of the asphalt. The rocks are an aggregate crushed to a special specification for size and cleanliness. Next, a rubber-tire roller is used to set the rock into the liquid asphalt. Rolling orients the flat sides of the rock down



and produces a tighter chip seal. It takes two to four passes of the roller to set the rock. Sweeping is done at the completion of the chip seal process to remove surplus rock from the surface. This loose rock can grind and loosen rock set in the chip seal and damage the project. Sweeping is done within 4 hours of the rolling operation. A fog seal is then applied to top dress and further seal the newly applied chips, typically a day or two after the initial chip seal application.

The fog seal protects the chip seal from harmful UV rays that deteriorate the chip seal over time. Additionally the fog seal seals the rock on the chip sealed surface from the "top down" virtually eliminating all loose rock that is generally associated with chip seals. The fog seal adds to the overall appearance of chip seals, making them look much more like a freshly paved roadway. News from the May Council Meetings

The City Council met for 9 different meetings in May, with 3 of those meetings for the City of Florence and Florence Urban Renewal Agency Budget. Both of those budgets were approved by their respective Budget Committees the week of May 11th and are on to their next phase of adoption by the City Council and the

Florence Urban Renewal Agency Board.

May also saw the City Council take a good hard look at our past, present, and potential future practices and programs toward Economic Development during their May 6th work session. With a comprehensive look at the City's past planning efforts and the community outreach completed since January, the City Council elected to form a new Economic Development Committee to help assist the City of Florence in these efforts. The City spent a good portion of May recruiting for this body and held interviews during the evenings of May 27th and 28th.

Staying on the theme of Economic Development, the City Council also heard the annual report from the Florence Area Chamber of Commerce on their workings under the agreement between the City of Florence and the Chamber for marketing services. During the 2014 calendar year the Chamber saw an 8.5 % increase in walk-in visitors, 34.5% increase in visitor packets requested, and a 30% increase in social media traffic from the prior year. Way to go Chamber of Commerce for their wonderful efforts toward tourism.

Law enforcement provided ALICE training to school personnel. ALICE stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. It has been specifically designed to improve school officials' ability to protect students and coordinate with first responders in the event of an emergency. "We want to protect our kids and keep the community safe," stated Chief Tom Turner. "This training will allow us to train for emergency response

within a school facility."

School officials scheduled an in-service day to provide the training to teachers, administrators, assistants, office staff, bus drivers, and other school district staff. "Our Florence Police Department has been so supportive of this effort. We appreciate all our officers making it possible to bring this training to our school and community," said Superintendent Ethel Angal.





2014 Water Quality Report

As a water supplier, the City of Florence is required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to provide an annual Consumer Confidence Report, know as the Water Quality Report. It provides water quality data from January I to December 31, 2014. The report informs customers about our City water sources, the City's source water protection programs, if there are any contaminants in the drinking water, as well as the water analyses undertaken to ensure that the water delivered is safe and of the highest quality.

The City of Florence is proud of the high quality of our water supply, which consistently meets or exceeds all state and federal water requirements, and committed to providing

residents and business with top quality water service.
