Based on St. Vincent de Paul Society of Lane County's proposed housing rehabilitation project located at various locations in the City of Florence and other areas of Lane County, OR, consisting of no new construction and no new parking spaces, the Lane Regional Air Protection Agency (LRAPA) has determined the following:

- An Indirect Source Permit is not required under Title 20 of LRAPA's Rules and Regulations since there will be less than 250 parking spaces added.
- The project is not subject to any requirements to obtain an Air Contaminant Discharge Permit (ACDP) under Title 37 of LRAPA's Rules and Regulations, and
- The project is located in an area designated as being in attainment for all criteria pollutants. The City of Florence is in an area that is a designated as attainment for all pollutants, and the proposed activity will not result in emissions that exceed de minimis or thresholds emission levels for criteria pollutants. The Oakridge, Oregon area is currently designated as non-attainment for PM2.5, however the any projects in that service area will also not result in emissions that exceed de minimis or thresholds emission levels for criteria pollutants.
- Asbestos testing and removal activities must be conducted in accordance with LRAPA's Title 43 – Asbestos Requirements.

Hello Max.

I left you a voice message looking to see if you may still be an appropriate contact at LRAPA regarding Clean Air, in hopes that you are, I thought I'd follow up with an email. Last year I consulted with you regarding a HUD sourced Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) that was awarded to the City of Creswell and now we are doing the same program with the City of Florence who has received a new CDBG award.

Below is a copy of the initial email I sent you when we were discussing the project for Creswell – I have tuned it up for Florence and hope to conclude with the same finding of No effect.

The CDBG funds are for the purpose of performing owner occupied housing rehabilitation and this program that we manage throughout Lane County is called the Regional Housing Rehabilitation Program (RHRP). The focus for the RHRP will be for Florence however the service area covers all of Lane County except for incorporated Eugene & Springfield. Within the service area, we are aware that the City of Oakridge is presently listed as a non-attainment area. While the specific project locations are not yet determined, there could be an applicant from Oakridge, however we do not believe that the proposed activities would lead to an increase in air pollution or that it would expose humans to increased air pollution. Please refer to the attached "RHRP Program Description" document for a highlighted list of typical rehabilitation activities.

As per our conversation, I want to specifically address indirect impacts such as traffic or parking. Under the RHRP, there will be no work performed to create additional parking for the owner occupied residences, the program primarily focuses on repairs to the dwelling itself and shall have no impact regarding traffic.

We are completing an Environmental Review for compliance with HUD standards and the Clean Air Act applies. Please let me know if you need additional information for your review. We are asking for your comments about the proposed RHRP activities and/or your concurrence that the proposal would have no effect on the non-attainment area (Oakridge) air quality.

Please when you reply, reply to all, as I have also copied staff with the City of Florence including those Cc'd in this message, Joe Henry who is the responsible entity for the Environmental Review. Our correspondence will be incorporated to the Environmental Review Record.
