Dear Admiral Zukunft.

I am writing you to request that the City of Florence, Oregon be designated a Coast Guard City USA. Our beautiful coastal town is fairly small with a population of about 10,000 citizens, but we have a huge heart for Team Coast Guard and the members of our local Coast Guard Station Siuslaw River. Our Coast Guard Station will celebrate its 100th anniversary in Florence in 2017 and it has become fully integrated into our community over those 100 years. Thus, we would be honored to be designated a Coast Guard City and we believe there is significant merit for such recognition due to our long and mutually beneficial relationship.

The City of Florence and its citizens value the professional work of the Coast Guard men and women assigned to Station Siuslaw River. The Coast Guard plays an integral role in the safety of mariners on several miles of the Siuslaw River, the river bar and Pacific Ocean. Successful efforts have been made to acknowledge and honor these brave Coast Guard members and we continue to look for other ways to support and embrace them, including submission of this application for Coast Guard City.

Every year our community sponsors several celebrations and events in which the Coast Guard, as well as other military services, are recognized as an important part of the community. The Florence culture is a visibly patriotic one as evidenced by many veterans' groups, the Oregon Coast Military Museum, the Veteran's Memorial Park on the waterfront, and several patriotic events. Our annual Rhododendron Festival and Veteran's Day Parade are just two of the events in which our local Coast Guard members participate and are honored.

This year, the Coast Guard will be the celebrated Grand Marshal of our Veteran's Day Parade and our Chamber of Commerce has just announced that in 2017, the Coast Guard will be the Grand Marshal of our Rhododendron Parade, the second largest parade in the State of Oregon. The theme of the 2017 parade will be *Always Ready to Rhody* as an homage to the Coast Guard motto, *Semper Paratus*.

On October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2016, the City of Florence and the Oregon Coast Military Museum hosted a Coast Guard Appreciation Dinner at the Florence Events Center. It was a semi-formal military style dinner and ball for the sole purpose of the community showing appreciation for local Coast Guard personnel and their guests. Challenge coins, specially designed for the event, were given to Coast Guard members and Auxiliarists as another token of appreciation. The dinner was well attended with over 250 guests.

The city's continued support for Team Coast Guard is demonstrated in the above examples and in other ways described in this application. You will find an extensive record highlighted in the accompanying documentation.

#### Background

As aforementioned, the City of Florence will celebrate their 100 year relationship with the United States Coast Guard in 2017. USCG Station Siuslaw River has a substantial history in this area and the community embraces Station Siuslaw River on several levels as exhibited by vigorous community wide outreach, actions and events shown in the following pages.

Maritime commerce started on the Siuslaw River about 1876 with sawmills and seafood canneries. In 1883, a beacon was placed at the river's mouth due to vessels crossing the bar on a regular basis. As early as 1889, Florence solicited Congress for a life-saving station at the mouth of the Siuslaw River, but initial requests were denied. However, the famous Heceta Lighthouse was completed in 1894 and other maritime improvements came over the years to make the river more navigable. A station was not approved on the Siuslaw until 1915, shortly after the Life-Saving Service became the Coast Guard. The station property was purchased in 1915 and the station construction was finished by 1917.

#### More about Florence

Located on the central Oregon coast, Florence is a scenic and recreational paradise. It lies at the mouth of the Siuslaw River on the Pacific Ocean about midway between Newport and Coos Bay along U.S. Route 101. A charming town, which was originally a mill and fishing town, Florence has a population nearing 10,000. The Old Town boasts a number of interesting shops and restaurants, and there is a marina and RV campground on the waterfront. Along Highway 101, there are many new businesses in this growing area of the Oregon coast. The town is adjacent to Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area.

Fishing, recreational boating, camping, dune buggy rides, sand boarding, shopping, crabbing, clamming, birding, hiking, sightseeing, art galleries and golfing are but a few of the activities available in Florence. Many of these activities are world class. There are two beautiful golf courses, and the Florence Events Center and Three Rivers Casino offer a variety of entertainment. The <a href="Port of Siuslaw">Port of Siuslaw</a> is also part of the city and there are other boat launches and a crabbing dock in the vicinity.

Florence is considered a destination tourist area and further economic planning and development are constantly in the works. One of the city's mottos is <u>A City in Motion</u>, referring to the many accomplished and foreseeable goals. People often choose to retire here due to the moderate climate, restaurants, outdoor recreational opportunities and most importantly, an appreciably strong and welcoming sense of community which serves well those Coast Members stationed here. We also have retired Coast Guard residents here and Coast Guard family members who have stayed even after their CG person (usually a child) has transferred elsewhere.

#### Events and Outreach Supporting and USCG Station Siuslaw River

• On October 7, 2016 the City of Florence and the Oregon Coast Military Museum hosted its first <a href="Coast Guard Appreciation Dinner">Coast Guard Appreciation Dinner</a> to celebrate the men and women of Station Siuslaw River. Over 250 guests attended the event at the Florence Events Center. It took several months to plan the event and many local organizations were represented on the planning committee. Every Station Siuslaw River active-duty member received personally addressed invitations, as did active Flotilla 52 Auxiliary members. Active-duty members, command staff from Sector North Bend and Auxiliarists all received a specially designed challenge coin upon arrival. The newly minted coin had the CG logo and Station Siuslaw River engraved on one side and the City of Florence logo and event date on the other. The local Band of Brothers veteran's group sponsored the coins. The dinner had several local sponsors including businesses, organizations and individual community members.

The program included the station's color guard team, a banquet, live music, speakers and dancing. During the evening, a video played on two large screens, on each side of the podium, showing photos and video clips of this year's activities by Station Siuslaw River. Speakers for the event included Florence Mayor Joe Henry, USCG Commander Charles Guerrero from Sector North Bend, Senior Chief Petty Officer Tim Tregoning (OIC Station Siuslaw River) and retired Brigadier General Norm Hoffman, who is also the Flotilla 52 Commander. Wayne Sharp, local radio personality and President of the Oregon Coast Military Museum board, was Master of Ceremonies. Mayor Henry expressed many kudos and recognized the critical importance of what Station Siuslaw River does every day. He expressed that the community stands with them and supports them in their heroic service and as neighbors and friends in the community in general.

#### Events and Outreach Supporting USCG Station Siuslaw River (continued)

- On January 28, 2016, the local movie theater, City Lights Cinema, had a special premiere showing of the
  Coast Guard movie The Finest Hours for local Coast Guard members and their families to acknowledge
  the professional and often heroic work of the local Coast Guard. The Siuslaw High School culinary team
  provided a Cape Cod themed menu for the special guests, which also included members from Station
  Umpqua River. The Siuslaw News printed a feature article and photos on the front page concerning the
  event, which included a description of the ongoing Coast Guard and community relationship.
- The Florence Chamber of Commerce announced that in 2017, the Coast Guard will be the Grand Marshal
  of our Rhododendron Parade, the second largest parade in the State of Oregon. The theme of the 2017
  parade will be Always Ready to Rhody as an homage to the Coast Guard motto, Semper Paratus. The
  Siuslaw News printed an article announcing the event.
- For the 2016 Rhododendron Parade on May 22, local Elks Lodge #1858 entered a beautiful, kinetic float honoring the 100 year presence of the Coast Guard in Florence. Coast Guard members and Auxiliarists rode on the float with Elk members. The float depicted an historical double-ender jumping a wave.
- For many years, Station Siuslaw River has been invited to and participates in both the Rhododendron Parade and Veteran's Day Parade. Over the years, Coast Guard Members have been honored and the Color Guard is often in a prevalent or leading position in the parade. Coast Guard Veteran's are also invited on a regular basis. For the 2016 Rhododendron Parade on May 22, Station Siuslaw River members were invited to and participated with their float, a trailed 25' RBS boat. The color guard also participated, following closely behind the Grand Marshal.
- USCG Station Siuslaw River will be the Grand Marshal of the 2016 Veteran's Day Parade on November 11th. As such, all members will be in a place of honor leading the annual parade.
- The City of Florence has maintained a Safe Boating partnership with the Coast Guard for several years and assists in promoting Safe Boating to the community.

On May 16, 2016, the City of Florence proclaimed Safe Boating Week and invited Station Siuslaw River members to attend the ceremony. Senior Chief Petty Officer Tregoning accepted the proclamation.

For Wear Your Life Jacket to Work Day on May 20, 2016, city officials and many other community leaders worked with the Coast Guard and donned life jackets to promote the Wear It campaign. Participants included the Mayor, City Manager, other city officials, Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue members, Port of Siuslaw members and several others.

For Life Jacket World Record Day on May 21, 2016, city officials and other community members went to Station Siuslaw River and joined Coast Guard members to add to the official world record count.

In August 2015, the City of Florence declared a city proclamation honoring the Coast Guard for its 225th Birthday. Station Siuslaw River members attended the ceremony.

#### Events and Outreach Supporting USCG Station Siuslaw River (continued)

• The Port of Siuslaw has maintained a Safe Boating partnership with the Coast Guard and Auxiliary for several years and assists in promoting Safe Boating to the community.

In 2016, the relationship continued with the Port providing classroom space for Safe Boating classes, assisting with Vessel Safety Check events by coning off areas and other duties, and promoting Safe Boating tips via radio PSA's on KCST and other media. The Port also provides a small building near the launch ramp for Auxiliarists to utilize when speaking with boaters and a place to store Safe Boating literature. The building has been provided and utilized for years.

Port of Siuslaw Manager Steven Leskin recently arranged for the Coast Guard to tour *Dredge Yaquina* (in September) when it was dredging the mouth of the Siuslaw River. When called upon, Manager Leskin readily provides support and information for Coast Guard press releases.

The Port provides space near the main boat ramp for remote bar restriction lights, run by solar power.

- In September 2016, Pacific Publishing of Florence released the Central Oregon coast phonebook with a
  photo of Station Siuslaw River 47' Motor Lifeboat on the cover. (Photo taken by Coast Guard Auxiliarist).
  Several other Coast Guard photos were dispersed throughout the phonebook. A Coast Guard PSA was
  included in the phonebook with other public safety PSA's. The publishing company provided extra copies
  for Coast Guard members and their families. Phonebook enclosed with this application.
- There has been sustained Coast Guard support from the local 126-year-old newspaper, *Siuslaw News*, for nearly the past century. More recently, during the past year, they have published dozens of press releases and Coast Guard-centered articles and photos, including Sailor of the Quarter info and Safe Boating announcements. The *Siuslaw News* works closely with the Station's Public Affairs Officer and they have subsequently published several feature articles including one about Women in the Coast Guard and Change of Watch events. They have featured the Coast Guard numerous times on the front page with *above the fold* photos. Some of those articles are included with this application.

#### **Recent Examples:**

March 12, 2016: <u>Women's History Month: Honoring the women who serve at U.S. Coast Guard Station</u> Siuslaw River.

May 14, 2016: <u>'Coast Guard City' could be on Florence's Horizon.</u>

January 16, 2016: Coast Guard Auxiliary Hosts Division Conference.

• In October 2016, *Siuslaw News* started production of their 2017 Florence Community Calendar. They have placed a photo of two 47' Motor Lifeboats from Station Siuslaw River on the Cover and other Coast Guard photos inside. (Calendar photos taken by Coast Guard Auxiliarist).

#### Events and Outreach Supporting USCG Station Siuslaw River (continued)

- City of Florence citizens volunteer hundreds to thousands of hours annually at Station Siuslaw River as USCG Auxiliarists augmenting watch standing, food services, public affairs, boat crew and mechanics on a daily or weekly basis. They have formed a close working relationship with Station members and command. Flotilla 52, which includes the active Florence detachment, celebrates 50 years this year.
- The Boys and Girls Club in Florence offers scholarships to CG dependents, allowing free membership to their children. The station's Food Services crew recently gave cooking classes to the children.
- The local Daughters of the American Revolution chapter provides welcome baskets for Coast Guard families newly stationed in Florence and bakery goods to the crew on major holidays.
- Sea Lions Caves, a local attraction, offers free admission to all active duty Coast Guard members and their families and extends the offer to Coast Guard Station Yaquina Bay members.
- Several local businesses offer discounts to local Coast Guard and other military. Examples include Fred Meyers' weekly military discount day and Grocery Outlet's discount card for active-duty military and veterans. They even offer a special parking space for disabled veterans.
- Local community radio station KXCR offers radio broadcast time for Coast Guard Safe Boating PSA's and announcements for Safe Boating events.
- For the past 3 years including 2016, Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue escorted Station Siuslaw River members during the annual Law Enforcement Torch run on Highway 101 through town.
- When the Oregon Coast Military Museum opened, Heceta Self Storage donated 5,000 dollars to the museum for a flag pole and Coast Guard flag that honors the United States Coast Guard.
- Besides recently hosting the Coast Guard Appreciation Dinner and honoring the local troops, the Oregon Coast Military Museum is actively making efforts to improve and enlarge their Coast Guard display.

#### Future Proposals

- The City of Florence is working on a proclamation for 2017 declaring it *The Year of the Coast Guard* in Florence, Oregon.
- The City of Florence Public Information Officer and Station Siuslaw River Public Affairs Officer will meet on a regularly scheduled basis (as often as needed) to discuss collaborative projects, continue to promote the Safe Boating partnership and continue to strengthen the relationship between the community and the local Coast Guard.
- The City of Florence proposes to make the Coast Guard Appreciation Dinner or a Public Safety Dinner (to include the Coast Guard) an annual event.

#### Other Community Partnerships and Events

Coast Guard members and their families are an integral part of the City of Florence. They are involved with and partnered in many community activities on-duty and off-duty, from school events and job fairs to sports and other community programs.

Senior Chief Petty Officer Tim Tregoning and his wife Amy were recently instrumental in helping set up
the Siuslaw Youth Soccer Association for different age levels. They serve on the board, coach and
referee. Four other station members coach and one other referees.

The City of Florence was able to help their initial efforts by investing in new soccer goals for the park.

- Coast Guard members partner with organizations like the Helping Hands Coalition who help the less
  fortunate. They also participate in beach clean-ups, school presentations, and other partnership
  activities. During the past year, station members volunteered for the Siuslaw School District to help
  administer Standardized Performance Testing. CG family members also volunteer with and participate
  in the local Children's Repertory of Oregon Workshops.
- City of Florence Parks Dept. allows Station Siuslaw members to utilize Miller Park for intramural sports with other Coast Guard units, and playing with teams from Siuslaw Valley Fire and Florence PD.
- The Chamber of Commerce invites station members to Chamber events, such as *Business After Hours*, which they sometimes attend.
- Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue and other public service agencies work with the Coast Guard on surf and beach rescues and other occurrences. Five Station Siuslaw River members currently volunteer for Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue and there is an excellent relationship between the agencies.
  - Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue recently presented a fire suppression training session during the station's *Boat Crew College.*
- The USCG is a partner agency with the City of Florence in collaborating with the Western Lane Emergency
  Operations Group for disaster preparedness. This year, USCG Station Siuslaw River participated in a multiagency Cascadia Rising exercise with Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue and Florence Police, among others, to
  help prepare for a large magnitude earthquake and accompanying tsunami along the Oregon coast.
- Every year, Station Siuslaw River and one of the 47' Motor Lifeboats are involved in the Memorial Day event held at Veteran's Memorial Park on the Siuslaw River waterfront near Old Town. The Station's Color Guard attends the ceremony on shore, while the 47' MLB crew lays wreaths on the water nearby, as the community watches from shore. The many wreaths are provided primarily by the VFW and Elk's Lodge.
- The City of Florence and other community groups invite the Station Siuslaw River Color Guard for different occasions including parades, holiday events such as 4th of July and Flag Day, State of the City address, etc. Station Siuslaw River is usually invited to other major community functions too.





#### Safe Boating Week

Participants included the Mayor, City Manager, other city officials, Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue, Port of Siuslaw and several others.

For *Life Jacket World Record Day*, city officials and other community members went to Station Siuslaw River and joined Coast Guard members to add to the official world record count.

Several businesses and organizations in Florence also participate in the Recreational Boating Safety Visitation Program and believe in supporting recreational boating safety to make our waterways safer for everyone by having displays with State and Federal boating safety literature.



As a member of the Coastal Caucus, a bipartisan, bicameral group of legislators, representing almost 400 miles of the coast, from the Oregon-California State line to the Colombia River at the Oregon-Washington State Line, I write to express my strong support for the City of Florence to be designated a "Coast Guard City." This designation will recognize the city's longstanding commitment to the U.S. Coast Guard Station and offers a tremendous opportunity to greatly enhance the city's public safety and economic vitality.

#### U.S. Coast Guard Station Siuslaw River

March 6, 2012

In recent months we have visited numerous locations around the state of Oregon that have enjoyed some aspect of military heritage – from the coast to the high desert. We've probably not touched on all of the locations out there, such as Portland's Kaiser ship yards that built the legendary Liberty Ships of WWII; or the numerous cavalry forts established during the Indian wars of Oregon's settlement years; and our community's home front defense activities during WWII. But I hope we have touched on enough locations to give you an idea of Oregon's rich military heritage. I thought it fitting that I finish this mini-series on military heritage right here in Florence, because after all, we are a Coast Guard town!

U.S. Coast Guard Station Siuslaw River was established in 1917, and serves today as one of seven lifeboat stations in Oregon whose primary mission is to provide search and rescue to commercial mariners, recreational boaters and surfers. But that's not all they do. Averaging nearly 200 cases a year, they also escort fishing vessels across the bar; provide marine environmental protection; conduct fisheries conservation enforcement; tow distressed vessels; and enforce boating regulations.

Recently becoming an autonomous station on its own, our local Station does this with an average compliment of 34 personnel, whose length of duty at this station can range from six-months to two years, depending on rank and service rating. This Station accomplishes this with two 47' motor life boats, which are the most active vessels, and one 25' response boat, which often does double duty by also performing in parades and public displays.

One of their more prominent and recent cases involved the rescue of the fishing vessel 'Dahlia', adrift for five days after losing power coming out of the Columbia River. Their faint radio signal was picked up by personnel from Station Siuslaw River; a motor life boat was dispatched and located them, towing them into safety to the Port of Siuslaw, gaining national press in the process.

Some people may have misnomers about the U.S. Coast Guard – such as it is not an armed-service like the US Army or USMC – but in reality the motor life boats are armed with fire-power and personnel are trained and armed with side-arms and sometimes participate in drug enforcement actions; the USCG chopper which we see regularly flying the friendly skies of Florence, is based out of North Bend not Florence, although they perform regular training exercises together.

The Officer in Charge, Sr. Chief Brent Zado, was on temporary duty out of the state when I visited the station, but I thoroughly enjoyed my visit with Executive Officer Chief Kyle Betts, who is obviously and rightly proud of his Coast Guard, his Station and his Coastguardsmen. When asked what important message he would want conveyed to the public, it was very mission-oriented: "Boating safety through sea-worthiness and lifejackets, and that we're always available to the public for their questions" he stated. One particular event Chief Betts is proud of is coming up: Coast Guard Day. Recognized every August 4<sup>th</sup>, this year the U.S. Coast Guard will be celebrating 222 years of military heritage and service to our nation and our communities. And even though our Coastguardsmen and women may not serve in harms-way overseas in some conflict, they serve the waters off our coast to keep us from harm's way by putting themselves on the line. Be sure to thank our local Coastguardsmen and women when you see them in our community.

- a. Presentation of a Certificate by the Mayor of Florence at a City Council Meeting.
- b. "Bio" story in Siuslaw News and press releases on local radio each quarter.
- c. Local businesses could make discounts available for the recipient, such as restaurant discounts or free meals, percentage discounts at local stores and recreational activities, etc.

Ideas and options are many. May I suggest a panel of representatives from the City of Florence, United States Coast Guard Siuslaw River Station, Florence Area Chamber of Commerce, and the Oregon Coast Military Heritage Museum be identified and established to create an effective, ongoing program which will honor the Patriots who are serving our great country, right here in our backyard.

Florence has been a city with a strong connection to the Siuslaw River, its many lakes and the Pacific Ocean since its settlement. Siuslaw News began as a newspaper 126 years ago, just 26 years before the Coast Guard came to the mouth of the Siuslaw River.

Over the past 100 years, this newspaper has observed and reported on Coast Guard Station Siuslaw River's water rescues, boat assistance and waterway condition monitoring. From the Siuslaw News office on Maple Street, we can observe the Coast Guard 47-foot Motor Lifeboat coming to the aid of boats and people at the docks of Port of Siuslaw. The inspiring sight often draws crowds of tourists and locals to the boardwalk. We hear — and publish — stories of Coast Guardsmen rescuing swimmers, even when they are off duty.

We can see the teamwork between Station Siuslaw River, Air Station North Bend, Station Coos Bay and the other stations in our sector. Station Siuslaw River also works with local emergency response teams to search and rescue, with some crewmembers donating their time as volunteer firefighters with Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue.





CASA volunteers work to prevent children from being re-abused by facilitating their move through the court and child protective services systems as quickly as possible into safe, permanent homes.



## The Challenge

In Lane County each year, about 1,200 children - half under the age of 6 - become victims of abuse or neglect by their parents.

Every day, judges decide the futures of these children in a court system that is too overburdened to focus adequately on the needs of each child.

Without an advocate to be their voice in court and with child protective services, abused and neglected children risk slipping through the cracks and suffering from future abuse.

## The Solution

RE: Saxon Annexation

The District's Staff has reviewed the proposed Saxon Annexation, as well as the City of Florence's Planners' recommendations, and would like to provide the following comments:

- As a partner in the land and water conservation within the Siuslaw Watershed, as well as a core partner with the City of Florence during the Siuslaw Estuary Partnership (SEP), the District has an invested interest in the well being and ecological function of the Siuslaw Estuary. It is widely known that estuaries are one of the most productive habitat types in the world, providing a multitude of ecosystem services that benefit the public in both economic and ecological ways. Estuaries are nurseries for valuable fish and wildlife, including water fowl, marine mammals, Pacific Lamprey, Steelhead, Chinook and (federally listed) Coho Salmon (etc.). Estuarine wetlands act as a sponge during annual high flow events (floods and extreme tides), moderating potential damage to public and private infrastructures. Estuaries also act as filters of excess nutrients and contaminants, assisting in maintaining good water quality. They provide the community greater resilience in regards to the ongoing threats of global climate change and surface sea level rise. Most of the estuarine wetlands within the Siuslaw have long since been lost to legacy land use practices (diking, agricultural conversion, shoreline development, etc.), as noted in your Chapter 16 Natural Estuary Management Unit designation description which states "in 1978, the Siuslaw had approximately 750 acres of tidelands, about 20 percent of the river's total estuarine habitat. Only the Salmon and Chetco River estuaries have smaller percentages of tidelands." Enabling future commercial development within the Siuslaw Estuary that compromises the integrity of the ecosystem services provided, is a step in the wrong direction.
- The petitioners state in their Annexation and Zoning Assignment Application to the City of Florence dated July 18, 2016, that the proposed annexation would allow for "additional commercial land to become available." If the City of Florence is indeed in need of a larger commercial land base, we are quite certain that there are more suitable and preferred locations for expansion than within the tidal estuary, an area that is already a fraction of the size it was historically.
- We hope that the City will revisit its finding regarding "the petitioners' phased site plans reviewed and approved by Lane County through their land use approval process for additional buildings to be placed on the piers are pre-existing non-conforming, albeit the approvals are over 20 years old." Land use laws within estuarine areas have drastically changed over the last 5 years, let alone 20. We believe that any structures that are not already constructed on the lots in question South of Hwy 126, should be required to meet current regulations at the local, state, and federal levels.

With water being such a vital resource now and even more so in the future, we recommend using caution
in moving forward with any plans that could potentially negatively affect the quality of waters within the
Siuslaw River Estuary.
