Aug 15, 2022 Statement to Florence City Council

Mr. Mayor, council members, City staff. Thank you for this opportunity to speak.

My topic tonight is the Disc Golf Course slated for the Munsel Creek Parkway. I am in support of it. While I'm sure that you have already heard about positive economic impacts that such an addition to the city would purported bring when the course was first planned and accepted by the City, so I won't belabor those points. Keeping Florence's recreational portfolio diverse and large, especially those activities that bring folks from out-of-town into town to spend their money, is already on your minds as leaders of an economy with a large facet based on tourism.

My support for the building the course in Florence is more focused on the benefits to the residents of Florence. I will give you three points to consider.

- 1. Like another sport, pickleball, that grew organically for a couple of decades before seeming exploding in popularity, disc golf has followed a similar pattern. The popularity of these sports seem to share some characteristics. The have a low-cost of entry, they are easy to learn to play, they are accessible to a large age and ability range, they are family-friendly, and most of the facilities are either low-cost or no-cost to use.
- 2. Many communities experience a greater utilization of the parks where disc golf courses have been installed. Utilization by people who have an interest in keeping the parks safe and looking nice. This positive traffic brought in by disc golf players is seen year-round in all sorts of weather.
- 3. My last point is strictly a selfish one. I am currently a very casual disc golf player. My local friends and I drive up and down the coast to our neighboring communities to play our rounds, then find someplace nearby to have something to eat and sample the local brews. I and we would like to have a course closer to home. I have a feeling that working our way through a local course will still bring on the appetite and thirst which will need to be satisfied before wandering home.

Thank you for your time and listening. If possible, could we have a status of the building of our course? I think that most of us are understanding of the mess that COVID caused, but we are hoping that we can get things started again soon.

Subject: Fairfax - a role model for declaring a climate emergency and adopting a climate action plan

I'm writing to ask that you follow the example of Fairfax, a town in Marin County 20 miles north of San Francisco, by declaring a climate emergency and developing a climate action plan.

On several occasions over the past three years I have asked the senior members of the Florence city staff and the members of EMAC to provide advice to you Mayor Henry, and to the members of the City Council, about the need to address climate change. On every occasion my requests were either ignored or after consideration rejected.

Because of the urgent need to act, I therefore have taken on the role of educating you Mayor Henry, the city councilors, city staff, and members of EMAC, and through this forum the community, about what can be done to address climate change. To this end I have researched what other cities and towns have done.

As a reminder, I have already provided for your review well thought out declarations of climate emergencies from Nederland in Colorado and San Anselmo in California. Today I offer you the extraordinary actions taken by the small town of Fairfax, with a population of 7,605. Fairfax is adjacent to San Anselmo and one of 10 cities in Marin County that have declared climate emergencies.

See below the full resolution from the Town of Fairfax and links to the declaration, climate action plan and the town itself. The Fairfax town link gives additional information about committees and partnerships that support the ongoing implementation of the plan and declaration.

It is my hope that this action by the Town of Fairfax will inspire you to work collaboratively with the Planning Commission, EMAC and community to declare a climate emergency and develop your own climate action plan.

RESOLUTION 19-04

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF FAIRFAX ENDORSING THE DECLARATION OF A CLIMATE EMERGENCY AND REQUESTING REGIONAL COLLABORATION ON AN IMMEDIATE JUST TRANSITION AND EMERGENCY MOBILIZATION EFFORT TO RESTORE A SAFE CLIMATE

WHEREAS, in April 2016 world leaders from 175 countries recognized the threat of climate change and the urgent need to combat it by signing the Paris Agreement, agreeing to keep warming "well below 2°C above pre-industrial levels" and to "pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C"; and

WHEREAS, the IPCC Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5°C, as well as the United States' Fourth National Climate Assessment, and the USGS Scientific Investigations Report 2018–5131 were all released in the Fall of 2018, the latest among many thoroughly vetted reports to sound the call for immediate, bold and transformative action; and

WHEREAS, the death and destruction already wrought by global warming of approximately 1°C demonstrate that the Earth is already too hot for safety and justice as attested by increased and intensifying wildfires, floods, rising seas, diseases, droughts and extreme weather; and

WHEREAS, climate change and the global economy's overshoot of ecological limits are driving the sixth mass extinction of species, which could devastate much of life on Earth for millions of years; and

WHEREAS, the United States of America has disproportionately contributed to the climate and ecological crises and has repeatedly obstructed global efforts to transition toward a sustainable economy, and thus bears an extraordinary responsibility to rapidly solve these crises; and

WHEREAS, restoring a safe and stable climate requires emergency mobilization on a scale not seen since World War II to reach zero greenhouse gas emissions across all sectors at wartime speed, to rapidly and safely draw down or remove all the excess carbon from the atmosphere, and to implement measures to protect all people and species from the consequences of abrupt human-caused climate change; and

WHEREAS, justice requires that frontline communities, which have historically borne the brunt of the extractive fossil-fuel economy, participate actively in the planning and implementation of this mobilization effort at all levels of society and that they benefit first from the transition to a renewable energy economy; and

WHEREAS, fairness demands a guarantee of high-paying, good-quality jobs with comprehensive benefits for all, and many other tenets of a Green New Deal effort as the mobilization to restore a safe climate is launched; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Fairfax seeks to become a global leader by both converting to an ecologically, socially and economically regenerative economy at emergency speed, and by catalyzing a unified regional just transition and climate emergency mobilization effort this year;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Fairfax declares that a climate emergency threatens our city, region, state, nation, civilization, humanity and the natural world; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council commits to a town wide just transition and climate emergency mobilization effort which ends town wide greenhouse gas emissions as quickly as possible and no later than 2030, immediately initiates an effort to safely draw down carbon from the atmosphere to reverse global warming, and accelerates adaptation and resilience strategies in preparation for intensifying climate impacts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council, together with its Climate Action Committee, will seek appropriate financial and regulatory assistance to these ends from public and private sources including the Town of Fairfax, the County of Marin and State and Federal authorities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council, together with its Climate Action Committee, commits to educating its residents about the climate emergency and working to catalyze a just transition and climate emergency mobilization effort at the local, state, national, and global levels to provide maximum protection for our residents as well as all the people and species of the world; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council underscores the need for full community participation, inclusion and support; and recognizes that the residents of Fairfax, and community organizations, faith, youth, labor, business, academic institutions, homeowners' associations and environmental, economic, racial, gender, family and disability justice and indigenous, immigrant and women's rights organizations and other such allies will be integral to and in the leadership of the mobilization effort; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council commits to keeping the concerns of vulnerable communities central to all just transition and climate emergency mobilization effort planning processes and to inviting and encouraging such communities to actively participate in order to advocate directly for their needs along with the need to avert global climate disaster; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council joins a nationwide call for a regional just transition and climate emergency mobilization collaborative effort focused on transforming our region and rapidly catalyzing focused action at all levels of government and society to restore a safe climate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town just transition calls on the State of California, the United States of America, and all governments and peoples worldwide to initiate a just transition and climate emergency mobilization effort to reverse global warming by restoring

near pre-industrial global average temperatures and greenhouse gas concentrations, that immediately halts the development of all new fossil fuel infrastructure, rapidly phases out all fossil fuels and the technologies which rely upon them, ends greenhouse gas emissions as quickly as possible, initiates an effort to safely draw down carbon from the atmosphere, transitions to regenerative agriculture, ends the sixth mass extinction, and, as much as possible, creates high-quality, well-paying jobs for those who will be impacted by this transition.



- Access to Street Closure Area Residents, Visitors,
 Deliveries and Event Participants
- Sanitation Trash Receptables, Public Restrooms, Handwashing Stations
- Security
- Emergency Services Access

The City has:

- Notified business and property owners within 100 feet of street closure of the public hearing to discuss this application.
- Notified Siuslaw Valley Fire & Rescue and Western Lane Fire & EMS of the event.
- Posted a Public Hearing Notice in the Siuslaw News on August 3rd.
- Reviewed the street closure application for compliance with City code.





Proposed Zoning Assignment










Figure 4-43 - Figure 5-1 from SWMP2000, shows existing drainage infrastructure and flooding problems in the neighborhoods northwest of the city boundary



Board, Commissions, & Committee Recruitment Overview

Charter:

The Florence City Charter gives the authority to the Mayor to make all appointments to the City's Committees and Commissions. Section 21 of the Florence City Charter states:

Section 21. <u>Mayor.</u> The Mayor shall appoint the committees of the Council provided by the Council rules:

Florence City Code:

The process for making those appointments, including process for inclusion of the City Council and the public in the decision making, are specified in Florence City Code Title 2, Chapter 1. Section 4-C & D of this code chapter designates the appointment process for the City's Commissions and Committees noting the following:

- C. <u>Appointment Process:</u> Prior to making any appointment authorized herein, the Mayor shall:
 - 1. Provide notice to the public and the Council of the position to be filled, qualifications if applicable, and the time and manner in which application may be submitted.
 - Solicit recommendations from the Councilors concerning potential appointees; and
 - 3. Confer with the Council, at a meeting, or with each Councilor individually, concerning potential appointees.

D. <u>Appointment Process Amendments:</u> Notwithstanding paragraphs A and B of this section, upon receipt of the Mayor's notice required under paragraph C.1, but before an appointment is made, the Council may direct a different appointment process be followed in filling a position on a particular board, commission or committee.

The August 15, 2022 City Council meeting serves to fulfill the requirements of the Florence City Code by providing a:

- Notice to the public and Council on the positions to be filled, qualifications if applicable, and the time and manner in which applications may be submitted (FCC 2-1-4-C-1)
- Opportunity for the City Council to direct a different appointment process be followed in filling a position on a particular board, commission or committee (FCC 2-1-4-D)






