1 - General Comments

Lane County's Co-Adoption of Annexation Policy

The Lane County Board of Commissioners continued its public hearing from Jan. 31 to March 21 to take testimony on annexation policy to be included in the Florence Realization 2020 Comprehensive Plan. The March 21 hearing was rescheduled to April 25 due to inclement weather.

3 - Committees and Grants

This section of the Community Development monthly report describes activities of committees and progress on grant-funded projects.

CITY COMMITTEES STAFFED BY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Environmental Management Advisory Committee (EMAC), Wendy Farley

March 13th Regular Meeting – The committee held a public hearing on the Residential &
Commercial Solid Waste Rate Review and made a recommendation to City Council.

Recommendations included moving from a minimum and maximum rate system to a flat rate and a three year incremental rate increase plus CPI to bring haulers into a 9% profit margin. Roll-off rates were not recommended to change. The EMAC refined their 2012 goals (see attached). City Council held a public hearing on March 19th on EMAC's recommendations for the rate review. The Council approved Resolution 5, Series 2012.

<u>Next Meeting</u> – EMAC held a special meeting April 5th to review nominations for the Greener Florence Award which will be considered by Council on April 16. The next EMAC regularly scheduled meeting is April 19th. Topics will include: Florence Green Fair staffing and table content, recycling website, and staffing updates.

Planning Commission, Sandra Belson

The Planning Commission is meeting twice a month to hold public hearings for land use applications and public hearings/deliberations on the update of the Transportation System Plan.

GRANT FUNDED PROJECTS

Update Transportation System Plan (TSP), Community Transit Plan, and Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for transportation improvements

Transportation & Growth Management (TGM) Grant managed by Sandra Belson \$155,000 - joint program of DLCD and Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), financed in part by federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) and State funds

On March 27, the Planning Commission held a work session and public hearing on the Draft Transportation System Plan and related Comprehensive Plan and City Code amendments. The Commission continued the public hearing until April 10 to allow for additional testimony. The Commission will deliberate and pass a resolution recommending adoption of a Transportation System Plan and associated amendments. The City Council will then hold a work session public hearing, tentatively scheduled for May 21. Meanwhile, Lane County will be processing the Draft TSP as well with a public hearing before its Planning Commission scheduled for May 15.

Siuslaw Estuary Partnership

West Coast Estuaries Initiative for Coastal Watersheds managed by Sandra Belson \$566,797 - United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)

The Siuslaw Estuary Partnership is in its third and final year of the project. The Interdisciplinary Team continues to meet to provide staff support for the project and the third round of public involvement is in process. The brief summary below provides a quick snapshot of where the project stands today.

Project Elements Update:

I. SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATION: The Interdisciplinary Team continued to provide staff support for the project.

II. PUBLIC EDUCATION AND STEWARDSHIP:

- Figure 1.20 Stakeholders: The Community Stakeholders met on Wednesday, March 21 from 4:30-7:00 p.m. and the Elected Official Stakeholders met on Thursday, March 22 from 6:00-8:00 p.m. to provide guidance on potential management strategies for the Aquifer Protection Plan and to review and comment on proposed significance determination and protection measures for wetlands and riparian areas. The agenda packets for those two meetings are posted to the web site: www.SiuslawWaters.org. The next meeting for both Groups will be April 19 with the Community Stakeholders meeting from 4:30-6:20 and the Elected Officials meeting from 6:30-8:30. The topic for the April meetings will be to provide guidance on the wetlands and riparian areas proposals and a vision for the Estuary Trail; and the Elected Official Stakeholders will also receive a presentation on key estuary wetlands.
- Newsletter: The third annual newsletter has been prepared and distributed in utility bills. During the week of April 16, it will be sent to property owners who own property with a significant wetland or riparian area or in the capture zone for existing and future well fields.
- Open House: The third Open House is scheduled for April 30, 2012 at the Florence Events Center from 4:00 to 7:00 pm. Draft reports for products due to be completed this year will be presented for public comment. The Open House format will include in-depth presentations on each of the draft products along with a Question and Answer session. A drop-in format will occur simultaneously. This format allows people to participate at the time their topics of interest are presented as well as providing staff support related to all topics at the time that is most convenient for individuals.
- Middle School: Senior Planner Wendy helped Jim Grano set up a workshop for 8th Grade students at Siuslaw Middle School on April 5 and an Estuary Exploration and Restoration Field Trip on April 10 and 11. During the field

trip, students removed invasive plants such as Scotch broom from Port property, learned about the history and function of the estuary, and explored the mud flats in hip boots and dug for clams and such. They then visited the city's Water Treatment Plant and City wellfields at Munsel Greenway Park.

III. WATER QUALITY AND QUANTITY:

The paper, "North Florence Dunal Aquifer Discussion Paper: Options to Protect Surface Water and Groundwater Quality in Response to Contamination Threats" is still under review by City staff and DEQ. This paper documents the results of the discussion from the January 25, 2012 meeting with the City Manager, Community Development Director, and Public Works Director, Lane County staff and the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) Regional On-site Program Manager and DEQ surface water and drinking water program staff, along with Planning Consultant Carol Heinkel and GSI Hydrogeology Consultant Dennis Nelson.

Aquifer Protection Plan:

- The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has formally certified the delineations of the existing well fields.
- The certified delineations (Drinking Water Source Area or DWSA) within the North Florence Sole Source Dunal Aquifer, will be considered a "significant groundwater resource" under Goal 5 because the "public water system served by the wellhead area has a service population greater than 10,000 or has more than 3,000 service connections and relies on groundwater from the wellhead area as the primary or secondary source of drinking water." [1] As such, it will be adopted as part of Florence's Comprehensive Plan along with policies to protect the resource.
- DEQ will certify the Aquifer Protection Plan for the Source Water component. Local adoption is not required for that to occur; but the City and the County both have to "sign off" on the Plan before DEQ will certify it. This "sign off" could occur by motion after a work session with the City Council and the Board of Commissioners. It could conceivably be a joint work session. Staff could put the item on the agenda and ask for a motion of support for the Plan and then it would be submitted to DEQ. Then, the Comprehensive Plan and Code amendments would be submitted to the City Planning Commission and Council with the goal of City adoption by September 30, 2012. County co-adoption could occur after City adoption; but co-adoption was not promised in the EPA grant work plan. City and County staff could ask to have this item go before the elected officials in

- the Spring, after the April 30 Open House. That way, staff can report on any public comments received at the Open House.
- Siuslaw Interpretive Site: The City has received planning approval for the project which is using Federal Highway funds and local funds; the plans were shipped to the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) for its 18-20 week approval period. The goal is to meet the November in-water work period. It will be an ODOT project and ODOT will be in charge of the bidding process. They hope to break ground by late fall/early winter.

IV. WETLANDS AND RIPARIAN AREAS PLAN:

The Stakeholders reviewed and commented on the proposed significance criteria and protection measures for wetlands and riparian areas at their March meetings. Staff and City volunteer Clarence Lysdale are currently working with Wetlands and Riparian Area Team members and Community Stakeholder Del Phelps to resolve issues related to the width of the riparian setback on a portion of Munsel Creek. Staff are preparing a Discussion Paper to help inform the Stakeholders' discussion of wetland and riparian buffers at their April meetings. The next step is to prepare draft Code language and Comprehensive Plan amendments and to make that available for public comment at the April 30 Open House.

V. KEY ESTUARY WETLANDS:

The Siuslaw Watershed Council (SWC) and sub-contractors (McKenzie River Trust (MRT), Green Point Consulting (GPC), and Habitat Contracting (HC)) continued wrapping up the majority of the Partnership-EPA funded actions on the Key Estuary Wetlands component of the Partnership. As noted previously, EPA funded work associated with North Fork Marsh and collection and analysis of monitoring data are complete. Trained volunteers continue to collect water quality and invasive species data. The SWC, MRT, HC, GPC and partners are progressing with restoration actions including infrastructure removal preparations and analysis of design options. The Draft Waite Interim Management Plan is progressing with the portion funded through the Partnership complete. The partners continued to work on project development and to communicate with technical partners and advisors. The SWC continues to manage sub-contractors and facilitate Key Estuary Wetland Team communication at the SWC's Technical Team meetings. Work associated with the North Fork Marsh and the Waite Ranch Restoration Site is funded by the EPA, Oregon Governor's Fund, WWRI, ODFW R&E, OWEB, and other sources.

- a. Promote the yard debris drop-off program to prepare for a curbside yard debris program.
- b. Provide education on problems with yard waste contamination.

- b. Increase awareness and participation through community and Chamber presentations.
